



Y DAYS ON EARTH

MARY MAGDALENE (John 20:11-18) - Mary's last name most likely indicates that she was from Magdala, a city on the southwest coast of the Sea of Galilee. She first encountered Jesus when he cast out seven demons from her. and her life was forever changed (Luke 8:2). Mary witnessed most of what took place surrounding Jesus' crucifixion, and was also one of the first to witness the resurrected Christ. It was Mary Magdalene whom Jesus sent to tell the disciples about his resurrection.

THE 'OTHER' MARY (Mark 16:1) This was Jesus' and James' mother.

SALOME (Matthew 28:1) - This was the mother of the disciples James and John.

JOANNA (Luke 24:10) - Joanna was an upper-class Jewish woman who married Chuza, an influential member of the staff of Herod Antipas, the Romanappointed ruler of Galilee. At some stage in her life Jesus cured her of an unspecified illness. In Luke 8:1-3, she is noted as providing for Jesus and the disciples. She knew Jesus

well and was committed to his mission.

CEPHAS (1 Corinthians 15:5) – This is Peter, who denied Jesus three times. Cephas is his name in Aramaic, which translates to Peter. In Luke 24:34, he is called Simon.

CLEOPAS (Luke 24:13-35) – He was a disciple of Jesus who was traveling on a road to Emmaus with another man when Jesus met them.

THE DISCIPLES AT THE TIME OF JESUS' RESURRECTION

- Originally, Jesus chose twelve disciples: Peter, James, John, Andrew, Bartholomew (Nathanael), James (the Lesser or Younger), Judas, Jude (Thaddeus), Matthew (Levi), Philip, Simon the Zealot, and Thomas. After Judas betrayed Jesus for thirty pieces of silver, he hung himself (Matthew 24:14-16) before Jesus was crucified. After Jesus ascended into heaven, Matthias was chosen to replace Judas (Acts 1:15-26).





While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. - Luke 24:15-16

And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. – Luke 24:19-21

When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he vanished from their sight. - Luke 24:30-31

THE SETTING

On a road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) Although it is generally believed that Emmaus was Northwest of Jerusalem, no one can be sure. It is clear, however, that Emmaus was situated seven miles from Jerusalem, so they were out for quite a walk!

KEY POINTS

It had been three days since Jesus died. These disciples had given up hope that Jesus was the one who would ultimately redeem Israel. Despite the fact that they had heard reports that the tomb was empty and Jesus was alive, they didn't believe it. They leave us with the impression that they were disappointed in God because things didn't go the way they expected them to go.

As the disciples walked and talked, Luke says in 24:16 that "their eyes were kept from recognizing" Jesus. He does not say that "they didn't recognize him." In other words, this was intentional. This wasn't a fault of their eyes.


The road to Emmaus marks a literal journey of two followers of Jesus and also a figurative journey of our walk with him.

KEY TERMS

BELIEF: an acceptance that a statement is true or that something exists; trust, faith, or confidence in someone or something

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

When did you stop knowing about Jesus and start believing in him? If you haven't yet, what is holding you back?
Have you ever doubted Jesus when things didn't go as you had planned? If so, what were the circumstances? If you simply doubt him and his work, what is one thing that you are willing to do to grow in your understanding of him and his desire for your life?
Describe a circumstance when it was clear to you that Jesus was involved in your life.
What can you do to share your faith in Christ and his faithfulness in your life with others who doubt him?





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KEY VERSES

Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We will go with you." They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

– John 21:3

Just as day was breaking, Jesus stood on the shore; yet the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, do you have any fish?" They answered him, "No." He said to them, "Cast the net on the right side of the boat, and you will find some." So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in, because of the quantity of fish. – John 21:4-6

Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." Now none of the disciples dared ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. - John 21:12

THE SETTING

Sea of Tiberias (John 21:1-23) - Also known as the Sea of Galilee, this body of water isn't actually a sea but a freshwater lake where Jesus walked on water. It sits about 700 feet below sea level, the lowest fresh-water lake in the world. It is only the second-lowest lake overall, coming in behind the Dead Sea, which is a salt-water lake. It is at the Sea of Tiberias where Jesus restored Peter.

KEY TERMS

OBEDIENCE: compliance with an order, request or law; submission to another's authority

CALLING: a strong inner impulse toward a particular course of action, especially when accompanied by conviction of divine influence

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION

In what area of your life are you most impatient when waiting on Jesus? In what ways can you be more obedient
in these areas?
What is it you feel God made you to do?
How can you prioritize your life to do
more of what God made you to do?





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When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." He said to him, "Feed my lambs." He said to him a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was grieved because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep." - John 21:15-17

Jesus said to him, "If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you? You follow me!" – John 21:21

THE SETTING:

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KEY TERMS:

There are two Greek words used in this passage that are translated as love:


AGAPE: highest kind of love; sacrificing love; divine love

PHILEO: love of a friend; fondness of another

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KEY VERSES

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." - Acts 1:8

And when he had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. -Acts 1:9

And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." – Acts 1:10

THE SETTING

Mount called Olivet (Acts 1:12) - This mountain is also referred to as Mount of Olives and Bethany in Luke 24:50. It is a mountain ridge that sits east of Jerusalem, and the place from which Jesus ascended into heaven. During Jesus' time on earth, the slopes of the ridge were covered in olive trees. Today, the slopes are home to more than 150,000 Jewish graves.

KEY TERMS

Power: the ability to do something or act in a particular way; ability to produce an effect
